I. Introduction

This report is prepared by the Cambodian Rehabilitation and Development Board of the Council for Development of Cambodia (CRDB/CDC) for the twelfth meeting of the Government-Development Partner Coordination Committee (GDCC), held on 4 March 2008. Preparation and contents of this Report are informed by the questionnaires completed by Technical Working Groups (TWGs) and returned to CRDB/CDC as part of routine reporting between TWGs and CRDB/CDC in its role as the Secretariat of the GDCC. This Report will:

- 1- Synthesize progress reported by each TWG related to:
 - a) The implementation of their Action Plans
 - b) Progress in implementing agreed JMI activities
 - c) Implementation of the H-A-R Action Plan; and
 - d) Resource mobilization issues.

- 2- Provide updates to the recommendations raised in the previous report (progress report to the 11th GDCC meeting in October 2007), namely on:
 - a) Increased support to TWG Secretariats
 - b) Training in aid management and leadership
 - c) Support to aid coordination through the Cambodia ODA Database
 - d) Outreach and technical support from CRDB/CDC.

The Report has four sections. Following this Introduction (Section I), Section II synthesizes overall progress in the four areas and highlights important issues identified by TWGs. Section III presents details of activities led and carried out by CRDB/CDC as a follow-up to the recommendations presented at the last GDCC meeting in October 2007, focusing on supporting capacity development efforts of TWGs and providing support both technical and operational to TWG Secretariats to enable them to play the roles as identified in the Guidelines on the Role and Functioning of TWGs. The Annex (Section IV) contains detailed progress reported by each TWG.

II. Synthesis of TWG Reports to GDCC

This section synthesizes progress reports of TWGs in four areas: (1) Implementation of TWG Action Plans; (2) Progress on JMIs; (3) Implementation of H-A-R Action Plan; and (4) Resource issues. Table 1 presents a snapshot of overall progress by highlighting important issues that need further consideration and dialogue at the GDCC and in the TWGs.

Implementation of TWG Action Plans

Overall, since the last GDCC meeting held in October 2007, implementation of TWG Action Plans has been progressing well. Some TWGs have completed the identified activities, while for others progress is being made toward implementing the agreed actions. At the same time, it was identified that resources to manage TWG workload continue to be a constraint for most TWGs. Besides the issue of funding, poor attendance by members was identified by one TWG, Fisheries, to have caused delay in implementing activities agreed in the Action Plan. Through the GDCC, TWG Gender has called upon development partners and line ministries and agencies that have developed Gender Mainstreaming Action Plans (GMAP), to support the implementation of the GMAP. The Rural Water Supply, Sanitation and Hygiene (RWSSH) TWG, its establishment decided by the government last year, has also made

headway, and had its secretariat set up and work plan prepared and endorsed. The RWSSH TWG reported that works are underway to prepare a rural water and sanitation sector strategy.

Progress on JMIs

TWGs have reported that, despite challenges, progress is being made to meet the JMI targets agreed at the First Cambodia Development Cooperation Forum in June 2007. For Health, HIV/AIDS, Mine Action, and PFM TWGs, JMI targets that fall within the mandate of the respective TWGs are being met, with a new JMI target being proposed by HIV/AIDS TWG (related to the percentage of HIV positive pregnant women who received anti-retrovirals to reduce the risk of mother-to-child transmission). For other TWGs, D&D, Food Security and Nutrition, Gender, Infrastructure and Regional Integration, Land, Legal and Judicial Reform, Partnership and Harmonization, Planning and Poverty Reduction, Public Administrative Reform, Rural Water Supply, Sanitation and Hygiene, good progress is being made. The following constraints, nevertheless, have been observed:

- Agriculture and Water - Delay in agreeing to a Statement of Principles to guide has presented itself as a constraint in moving forward the implementation of the Strategy on Agriculture and Water.
- Education - High repetition and drop-out rates in primary school continue to be the main challenges. Strategies on reduction of repetition and drop-out rates therefore need to be identified and capacity to conduct research on these issues need to be developed.
- Land - Although implementation of the sub-decree on ELCs is making progress, there is still the issue of access to information at the provincial level on ELCs of less than 1000ha. More funding and commitment from local authorities are necessary for forest demarcation.
- Private Sector Development - Lack of capacity and knowledge present a continued challenge in speeding up implementation of a Risk Management System.

H-A-R Action Plan Implementation

Overall, TWGs have made great strides in addressing the harmonization and alignment issues presented in their respective sectors. The Guidelines on the Roles and Functioning of TWGs, approved by the Royal Government in February 2007, appears to be a useful tool in guiding the work of TWGs. Discussions were made of the Guidelines in FS&N, Health, and RWSSH TWGs, and it has been reported that this has led to new approaches in strengthening the functioning of the TWGs.

Existence of a sector strategy or similar framework has been increasingly seen as necessary and supportive in harmonization and alignment efforts by TWGs and ministries and agencies. This is the case for F&E, Gender, HIV/AIDS, Land, and PPR TWGs, and reinforced by the advances illustrated by the PFM TWG. Moving toward a PBA for mine action and a RWSSH strategy has been considered by Mine Action TWG and RWSSH TWG respectively as an important step in harmonizing and aligning development partners' support. In contrast, the absence of a national program has presented a challenge for A&W TWG in advancing the harmonization and alignment effort.

Yet, the existence of such a strategy or framework on its own is less likely to lead to better aid results or increased harmonization of development activities, unless emphases are made as well to linking plans with resources and results, and adequate attention paid to capacity development. Even in well-established sectors like education, the need to move further to

deepen the implementation of the current SWAP is strongly felt. For the sector, different DP procedures are still prevailing, while the number of sector performance indicators is still large and needs to be streamlined. Despite having a SWAP, the degree of fragmentation of DP-supported initiatives is still high and presents a formidable coordination challenge. Similarly, progress that is being made in the health sector presents the ministry's efforts in addressing these challenges. A Taskforce for Deepening H&A in Health has been established, and likewise, an Institutional Development Plan developed, and will be finalized soon, one objective being to strengthen the ministry's institutional capacity and introducing a Performance Management System at the national level.

Ultimately, the need for more capacity development support is the key. Its importance cannot be overstated for Education, F&E, Gender, and Health TWGs as, with development partner support, efforts to strengthen Government systems are taken forward. As illustrated by the D&D TWG, during the formulation process of a National Programme for NCDD, emphasis is being placed on assessments of capacity to perform functions stipulated in the Organic Law at all administrative levels. The National Programme, for the immediate future, will define capacity building priorities necessary for implementation of the Organic Law while at the same time will provide a long-term capacity building framework to support the government's D&D reform. Progress that is being made by the Council for Administrative Reform on a national policy for human resource development and capacity development, seen in this perspective, is one of the most encouraging milestones.

Resource mobilization

Resources to manage the workload identified in the TWG Action Plans remain a challenge for majority of TWGs. Given the roles and functions expected of TWGs, as provided for in the Guidelines, ensuring a proper functioning of the TWG secretariats has turned out to be one of the priorities that need to be addressed.

III. Supporting Technical Working Groups

To ensure Technical Working Groups effectively perform its roles and functions as identified in the Guidelines on the Roles and Functioning of the Technical Working Groups one of the critical priorities is to ensure that TWGs are resourced and facilitated so they can work more effectively in supporting Government. This challenge, and a potential response, is addressed in the next Section.

Support to TWG Secretariats

Findings from the current TWG reports to the 12th meeting of the GDCC confirmed the need to support TWG secretariats as a support unit of TWGs in its operations, findings that had previously emerged from the capacity needs assessment conducted by CRDB/CDC in consultation with TWGs in June 2007.

A wide range of support has been identified by CDC that could be provided based on request from TWGs. At the last GDCC meeting, CDC announced that it may allocate resources from its Multi-Donor Support Program to support the functioning of TWG secretariats, based on the annual work plan and budget need that is endorsed by TWG Chairs and development partner facilitators. At the time of preparing this report, proposals for financial support have been received from seven TWGs and are being processed by CRDB/CDC.

Training in Aid Management: Deepening knowledge on PBA/SWAP

The need for development cooperation to shift away from stand alone project approach to a sector/thematic program-based approaches, as clearly called for in the Strategic Framework for Development Cooperation Management has made demand for aid management capacity increase, particularly within the realm of programme based/sector wide approaches (PBA/SWAP). This was one of the areas that show the need for dedicated support following the capacity needs assessment conducted in June 2007.

Based upon discussion with TWG focal points, who had been nominated to attend a two-week training course in the Philippines in September, last year, deepening knowledge on Programme-Based/Sector-Wide Approaches has been identified as an area where CDC can support TWGs to move forward. In response to these requests, CRDB/CDC organized a training course that emphasized the application of, and experience gained from, PBA, in Sihanoukville, from 11-14 February 2008.

The training was facilitated by trainers from a renowned institute, HLSP (www.hlsp.org) and provided an opportunity for interaction and exchange, not only among TWG focal points, but also between CDC staff and TWG focal points, of experience on aid management across different sectors. TWG representatives from sectors that have taken the PBA/SWAP paths brought to the training course invaluable aid coordination experiences, as well as challenges, which through interaction, peer learning, and discussion, were in itself a useful form of capacity development that is based on actual experience related to what is happening across the sectors.

Building on existing foundations from the previous PBA/SWAP training organized by the Ministry of Planning in July-August 2007, different modules were adapted to Cambodia's specific cases and international best practices were applied throughout the course. This knowledge is of importance for TWG focal points in their work in different sectors afterwards, especially in those sectors where works are underway to move toward PBA/SWAP (e.g. Mine Action, RSSWH).

Cambodia ODA Database

Customization of the Cambodia ODA Database was completed last year, to enable it to serve more usefully aid coordination functions across the whole government. For the first time, TWGs have access to information on development cooperation activities that are being carried out within their sector or thematic area. Although much remains to be done to ensure the validity of the information available, this has provided a useful starting point for TWGs to engage with development partners on aid coordination issues. Support from development partners in entering the data is highly appreciated.

Trainings have been provided to TWG focal points on the features of the Cambodia ODA Database during the last quarter of 2007. CDC continues to support TWGs in making use of the information that is available for sector-specific purposes. The on-going survey to monitor the implementation of the Paris Declaration is also being conducted by making use of data reported by development partners in the ODA Database.

Outreach and Technical Support

Continued outreach and technical support will be necessary during the year. Following the two-week training conducted in the Philippines last year, a network of TWG Practitioners has been established. This has enabled more interaction between CDC as government's aid coordination focal point with line ministries/agencies and TWGs. As a first step, through this

network, TWGs have participated in the conduct of the 2008 Paris Declaration monitoring survey. Further support may include increased CRDB/CDC participation in TWG meetings, a re-launched website to provide enhanced access to aid management tools and documents, facilitation of meetings between Government representatives of TWGs so that experience can be exchanged and formal trainings can be provided.■■■

During the reporting period from June 2007 to September 2007, the following resource commitments have been finalized:

- C/S Fund has made commitments of increasing funding levels for the C/S Fund for 2008-2010 as follow:
 - 2008 = 2.70 % of current state revenues for 2007
 - 2009 = 2.75 % of current state revenues for 2008
 - 2010 = 2.80 % of current state revenues for 2009
- Rural Investment and Local Government Program Additional Funding from IDA Grant was approved totaling \$36.25 million for 2007-2010.

- IFAD Rural Livelihoods Improvement Project was approved totaling \$11.00 million for 2007-2012.

As the TWG-Gender is cross-sectoral this is a complex undertaking. The Secretariat and the Chair of the TWG-Gender is now supported by UNDP, JICA and UNFPA (for basic running costs, invitations, meetings etc, support to one MoWA staff member for the Secretariat, and policy advisory support to the Chair). As the activities, membership and workload has increased the Secretariat now needs further strengthening.

The TWG-Gender action plan included supporting resource mobilization for key-, and emerging gender concerns. Therefore the overall resource mobilization matrix will need to be updated.

The Cambodia Gender Assessment which is under preparation provides the basis for which key areas will be identified for future funding. The TWG-G was successful in mobilizing resources from 8 donors to support MOWA in drafting the Cambodia Gender Assessment.

On gender mainstreaming, the TWG-Gender has made use of the last two GDCC meetings and the CDCF as well as the donor lunch meeting to raise the awareness of both the government side and the development partner side on the importance of gender mainstreaming and has raised the issue of **financing for the implementation of the Gender Mainstreaming Action Plans** in all these meetings. The Secretariat has actively supported the focal points in other TWGs to follow up on this. Several development partners have in their workplans for 2008 included support to GMAGs and GMAPs but more are needed, especially those engaged directly with sector (line ministries).

TWG-G secretariat Initiated dialogue on moving towards a programme based approach to gender mainstreaming or a SWAp on gender. Members of the Secretariat attended the training provided on SWApS by the CDC recently. Main development partners indicate willingness to support this. Further dialogue necessary on this.

- The Water and Sanitation Program/ World Bank (WSP/WB) has initiated a Regional Program SAWAP (the Sanitation and Water Partnership for the Mekong Region) - three-year inter-country approach grant funded through WSP-EAP's regional budgets by Sida. This program will draw together Cambodia, Lao PDR, Vietnam, and Yunnan and Guangxi provinces of China.
- Discussion with the MEF for potential funding for Rural Water Supply and Sanitation Programs in some province through the IMF Financing Schemes.
- Finalize with JICA for financial supporting and signed agreement on the Rural Water Supply Program Phase-II in Kampong Cham, which will be implemented in 2007-2010.
